CALL TO ORDER

Meeting was called to order at 7:07 P.M. by Gladly Campion.

OFFICERS' REPORTS

PRESIDENT (Gladly Campion): No report.

VICE PRESIDENT (Grant Root): No report.

SECRETARY (Martin Arbagi absent):

Trustees reviewed the minutes of July 12, 2010 that were prepared by Martin Arbagi. Ron Williamitis moved the minutes be approved as corrected. Jim Ullom seconded, and the motion passed.

TREASURER (Nancy Christolear):

Nancy Christolear presented a financial report for the month. Gary Turner requested a reimbursement of \$120 for Hamvention, stating that he had been charged for one ticket in addition to the \$100 for the booth. ***USB Feedback from Last Month's Column**

I received some feedback from last month's comments about my flash drive experience. Paul Witheridge from the Sarnia, Ontario user group continued my comments about the accidental drive letter assignment being a coincidence because of the one time use to retrieve a file: he says "... except when you need to boot from that USB drive — in that case, your hard drive will be either disabled (dead or disconnected) or reordered in boot sequence on purpose — is so the desired boot drive (USB in this case) can take the necessary C: letter assignment." [I had to read that last sentence three times before it made sense. — *TDB* Editor]



I responded that I wondered why a person would need to boot from a USB flash drive, proposing that "unless you were traveling and using a strange computer, or if you B & E'd a house to borrow the use of a computer temporarily," to which he responded: "Those are two scenarios, of course. Also, a dying hard drive, a severely virus infected hard drive, and running an alternative operating system are a few more."

I "think" I'm smarter now, but Paul is very knowledgeable so I hope you get something out of his comments.

***More On My Ricoh Printer**

In the past, I have mentioned how satisfied I was with my Ricoh color laser printer and Ricoh's technical support. I was brought into the real world recently when the store from which I bought it, located not very far from me, closed due the loss of lease. The chain has other stores, but they are all much further away from me. Since I needed some toner cartridges, I went to Office Depot to get them, but the store doesn't carry Ricoh cartridges. Neither does OfficeMax or Staples. I was unable to find them on their Web sites, and none of the three were interested in trying to order them. Their final response to me was: "Sorry, thank you ... goodbye."

I called Ricoh and I can order cartridges from "Ricoh Direct," but they are priced slightly higher than where I was buying them, and the product would be shipped from out of town. There'd be a shipping charge unless I was a volume customer. No user group discount though, which our user group receives from "Smart Guys Computers," from whom I originally bought it, <http://www.smartguyscomputers.com> Not only that, but when inquiring about getting cartridges, I also found out that my free tech support had run out. However, the guy told me that if I had a simple question, he would answer it for me anyway; otherwise, there would be a charge. The good part is the staff answer quickly, speak English, and they know their stuff.

Actually, there is another store operated by Smart Guys Computers that I do get close to occasionally and I'll try to stock up so I won't run out of cartridges. That way I'll still get an extra discount. I don't go that direction very much, so stocking up should solve the problem, but I was surprised to learn that cartridges for Ricoh printers were so

hard to find, considering that the company has been around for years, and its printers are widely used in commercial installations.

One thing I might mention is that I have not been overly impressed with the quality of the colored pages in newsletters that I've printed. There are a few tiny lines vertically through the picture and I don't know if other brands might have that flaw too.

***What Is Starting When Your Computer Boots?**

CodeStuff Starter helps you view whatever is starting while your computer is booting. CodeStuff Starter shows you what files are being run and what registry lines are initiating them, so you can disable them from starting.

When you disable them, it should only be temporary until you see what happens. It also tells you exactly what that program does. Of course, you need to read up on this to see if it's right for you. Bob Balogh likes this one and wrote about it several months ago in his monthly "Windows Pains" column, which appears in several newsletters. He is a member of Boca Raton Computer Society <http://www.brccs.org> CodeStuff Starter can be downloaded at <http://www.snapfiles.com/get/starter.html> The program is called "Starter," and the publisher is CodeStuff.

***A Free Backup Utility**

I read about this one some time ago in *Bits of Bytes*, a most interesting newsletter of the Pike's Peak Computer Application Society <http://ppcompas.apcug.org> It was in the "Around The Room" comments. This is a free backup that works similar to Acronis True Image, but the person who suggested it feels it is more user-friendly. That remains to be seen because when you buy an Acronis product, you get personal help from Gene Barlow if you bought it from him. [Gene Barlow recently gave a presentation at a regular DMA meeting. —*TDB* Editor] Anyway, this free backup is ToDoBackup and can be acquired at <http://www.todo-backup.com> When the product is free, it is understandable that there is no tech support. It looks like the software is free for home use, but they also offer online backup for a fee.

***A Great Christmas Gift**

I don't usually publish an item that isn't discounted or free, but I'm making an exception this time in the interest of making you aware of a neat Christmas gift idea. I tried to contact this company asking if they would consider giving my readers a discount on their unique flash drives, but received no response to either of two messages, which is not uncommon for me these days. These sites offer the most unusual flash drives that I have seen, so I'm passing the URLs along for you to take a look: <http://tinyurl.com/y6f3ecs> and <http://tinyurl.com/y1pxze9> I don't normally use Tinyurl in the column, because some readers tell me they prefer to know where they are going when they click on a link. But in this case, I decided to use them to keep the column shorter. [Tinyurl is a great convenience, but Bob and his readers are correct. You just don't know where you're going when clicking on a Tinyurl link. I pretested both links. They are legitimate, and some of these novelty drives are *hilarious!* —*TDB* Editor] I saw this information in *Nibbles & Bits*, newsletter of the Orange County [California] IBM PC Users' Group, <http://www.orcopug.org> The editor, Linda Gonse, does a remarkable job with this newsletter. —Smart Tips From *Smart Computing*—

- **Network Streaming:** If your Internet streaming is constantly being interrupted, shut down other downloads, restart the streaming application, and try again. If conditions don't improve, try restarting the stream later on. If there's a slowdown on the streaming server, the Internet, or your home network, your audio or video will stutter or freeze until more data arrive. Broadband is essential, at least for video streams. With a fast connection, you should be able to view video at its highest resolution available.
- **Photo Resolution:** Compared to a TV or monitor screen, a printed photo requires much greater resolution to deliver sharp-looking results. For example, an 8MP (megapixel) camera captures images with 8 million pixels (1MP is equal to a million pixels), which is enough detail for photos printed at sizes up to 8.5 x 11 inches. But if you tried to print a poster-size print from the 8MP image, the picture may appear blurry or pixelated. The more megapixels your images feature, the larger the prints you can create. Note that unless you plan on creating prints larger than 8.5x11, you don't need to focus on the megapixel count when shopping for a new digital camera because nearly all models offer more than 8MP.
- **Web-Connected Blu-ray Disc Players:** Blu-ray Disc players that feature Internet connectivity can stream online content anytime. Many Internet-connected BD players give you access to movies, music, photos, and more. In order to connect your Blu-ray player to the Web and your home network, you'll need a model with a built-in Wi-Fi antenna or you'll need to use an Ethernet cable.
