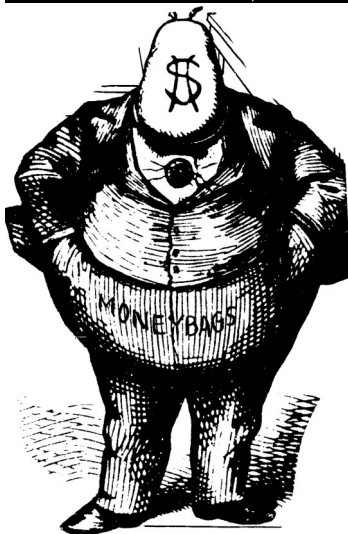

..... Tabs

A SECRETARY AT A LOCAL STATE UNIVERSITY was typing a column of figures for next year's budget. Although she was using tabs, somehow the column didn't look quite right. There was something subtly wrong with it. (See Figure 1, to the right.)

"What's wrong with my format?" she asked a professor who happened to be passing by (the guy had the reputation of being a nerd).

"The *column* lines up," replied the nerdy professor, "but that's not what you want in this case. The *decimal points* should be in line for it to look OK."

"You're right — why didn't *I* think of that? But how do you do it?"

A gradually diminishing number of us are old enough to remember tabs on manual typewriters, and the CLUNK a carriage made as it slid into place. Tabs are more versatile on modern word processors like Microsoft Word or Open Office Writer. Because it's all done electronically, there's none of that mechanical CLUNK that rattled the desk.

Decimal Tabs in Microsoft Word

Figure 2 shows the way that Secretary's budget *should* have looked, with decimal points aligned. Decimal Tabs align numbers around a decimal point.

The decimal point will be in the same position independently of the number of digits. (You can align numbers around a decimal character only; you cannot use a decimal tab to align numbers around a different character, such as a hyphen or an ampersand [&].) Word comes with a default tab set at .5" (½ inch). (By the way, I'm told that a half-inch is too much for proper paragraph indentation in desktop publishing or Web page design. One-quarter or even one-eighth of an inch is better. Paragraph indentation tabs in THE DATABUS are set to ¼".) Let's say you want your decimal tab to be at 1.5" (1½ inches). To set a tab, merely go to the Ruler Line (at or near the top of the page) and left-click with your mouse roughly where you want the tab to be set. The tab comes up by default as left-aligned, indicated by an L character. Now right-click on that L. The box in Figure 3 pops up. Click on the "Decimal" button, and presto! you have your Decimal Tab. This is shown by an inverted T with a tiny dot to its right, like this: ⊥.

Incidentally, you can also take the opportunity to set

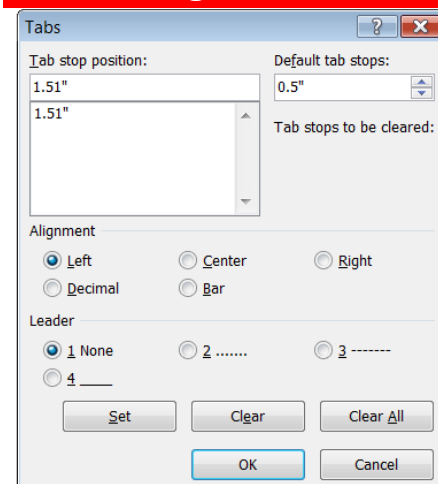

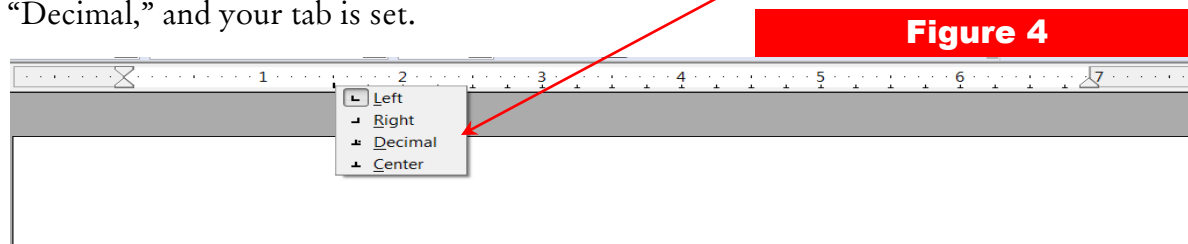

your tab *exactly* where you want it. Notice how this particular tab is .01" off from where you wanted it to be. Go to the Tab Stop Position box and correct the figure shown from 1.51" to precisely 1.5", which is where it's supposed to be.)

Decimal Tabs in Open Office

The procedure for tabs on Open Office is similar, but in my opinion, a bit more convenient than the one in Word. The Ruler Line in Open Office shows a proposed (not an actual) tab every $\frac{1}{4}$ ". If you agree with one of these proposed default tabs — let's say you want your Decimal Tab again to be at $1\frac{1}{2}$ " — left-click on it. It becomes a Left Tab by default. Right-click, and the tiny window in Figure 4 pops up. Now left-click on "Decimal," and your tab is set.



Leaders

Let's leave our newly-enlightened secretary and go to a situation where you're publishing a document long enough to have a Table of Contents. You'd like to set it up to look like this:

For Microsoft Word, go back to Figure 3 on the previous page and look at the "Leader" section, in the lower middle of the box. Select the leader you want. In the example above, I left-clicked on 2 to select a dot leader. But there's another step you must take to avoid *this* error:

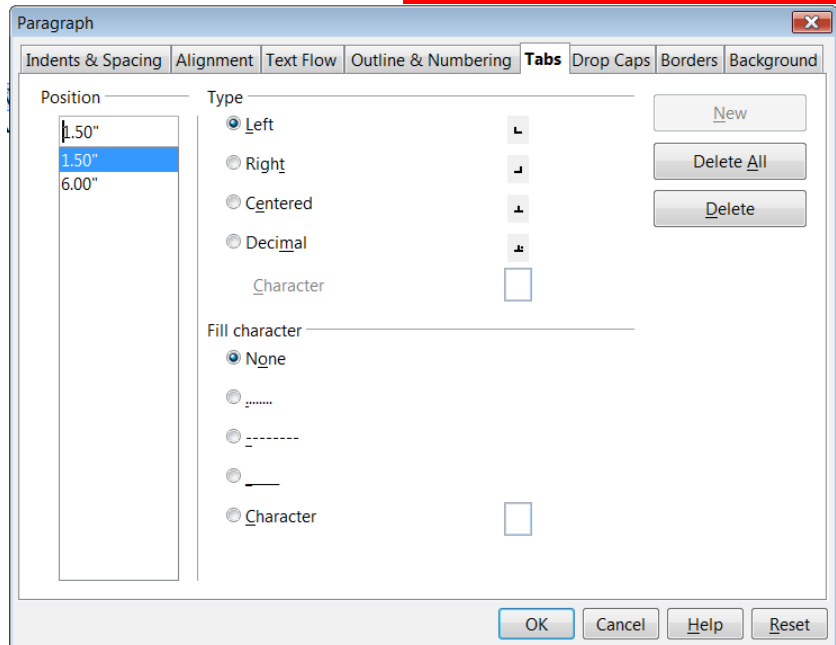

Like that secretary's first try, shown in Figure 1, there's something subtly wrong with the formatting here. What's the problem? Go back and look at Figure 3 again ... you guessed it! It's the "Alignment" section in the upper middle of the box. Default tab alignment is left, and for Tables of Contents in a document of more than 9 pages, you want *right* alignment.

Open Office is a bit harder. Go to the “Paragraph” menu at the top of the page and left-click. Now to the “Tabs” submenu and left click

on that. The box in Figure 5 opens. By default this opens on the “Indents & Spacing” tab, but I’ve already clicked on the “Tabs” tab. The rest is clear. First, select a position for your tab, allowing for how many characters follow it. Click on “Type” (“Alignment” in Word terminology), and select Right. Finally, select “.....” for the Fill Character (“Leader” in Word).

Note that Open Office gives you a bit more flexibility in that if you go to the bottom, you can select *any* character as your Fill.

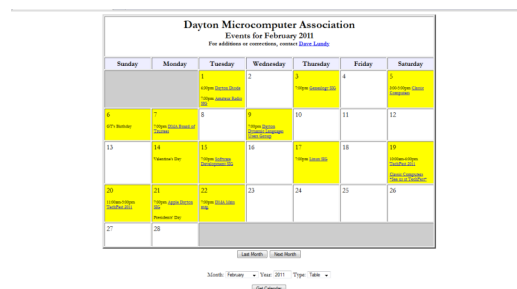
