

Meeting starts at 7:00 P.M., but come at 6 if you want dinner.

Since the introduction of the Raspberry Pi Model B, single-board computers have flooded the development world, especially the Maker community. These pocket-sized devices provide PC functionality to a multitude of open-source projects in amazingly compact, cost-effective, and low-power platforms. These tiny computers have sparked a revolution in embedded systems design.

Several DMA members have been busy building



projects with these devices. They come in many flavors: Arduino, Raspberry Pi, Beagle Bone, Parallax, etc. Gary Ganger will show a Raspberry Pi running Linux that he uses as his laptop. Stephen Frey has been working with SBCs for some time now. His Parallax Propeller Mini is used for the flight version of a model rocket guidance system. He also has several Raspberry Pi projects "in-process." Grant Root turned a Raspberry Pi into an internet Radio that he demoed at Techfest and the AFRL PiDay Maker Faire. Ken Phelps has been looking at the powerful new Parallella. If you have a project of your own, bring it with you!

Please note the new meeting place—same great cuisine, and this location is quieter than the Fairborn T. J. Chumpps. It's just off Interstate Route 70, exits 36 (if you're going east [for example, coming from Englewood]) or 38 (if you're going west [for example, coming from Springfield]). #### **—Easy Basic Backups—**

NFORTUNATELY IT IS NOT A PERFECT WORLD and, as you know, any mechanical device can fail. Because your computer or your hard drive can fail, everyone (this means you) needs to take the extra step on a regular basis to make sure that you have a good backup. I am always surprised at the number of people who just don't do backups at all—they will have a real problem if something goes wrong. There have been many "backup" articles written and I would encourage you to read some of them. But the purpose of this article is just to give you the basics first and then you can decide what further steps you need to take and what more information you may need. Here is the "basic backup" information:

- 1. Why do I need to do a backup? In case your computer or hard drive fails
- 2. What is a "backup" anyway? It is simply a copy on another memory device.

- 3. What should I back up? This is good question. I do not back up my entire "C" drive, I only back up those files that are important to me—those files I need to keep. I do not backup my software. For example, I have many documents (files) which I created using the Word program. Well, I can use someone else's Word program and their computer in an emergency to open those files from my backup device. I can also use Open Office to open those files. I just need my files which I have backed up and a computer that has Word or is connected to the Internet. Get the picture? A backup is also great when you get a new computer and need to put all your files in it. I back up everything in the "My Documents" and "My Pictures" folders—that is, I back up all the files I have in "My documents" and all "My photos." I do not back up "My music" or "My videos" because I don't have any of those that are important to me. You do not have to back up your e-mail or anything that you have saved on the Internet "cloud" (such as on Google Drive, or Dropbox for example). Certainly you may choose to use the Internet cloud as your backup device. Note: Photos and videos take up much more space than other files—see below.
- 4. How often should I do a backup? As often as needed so that you do not lose anything important. I do a backup every three or four weeks.
- 5. How do you do a backup? I use either an external hard drive or a thumb drive that plugs into a USB port on my computer. (I don't recommend using CD or DVD disks for doing backups as you will probably run out of space on the disk and have to use too many of them.) I just connect my drive, create a new folder on the drive called "backup 7-31-2014" (the date). Then I just open the Windows Explorer and drag the entire "My documents" folder to that backup folder, and then do the same for "My pictures." It takes about 20 or 30 minutes, but you can do other things on your computer in the meantime. While the files are being copied, you will see a green bar lengthen from left to right until the copy is complete. There is also a time estimate shown which is usually inaccurate.
- 6. **How much space do I need on the device?** To find out how much space you are using now on your "C" drive for any folder, open up the "Windows Explorer" program and, on the list of folders in the left column, find "My documents." *Right*-click the mouse on that folder to get a pop-up menu, then left-click on "properties." You will see how much space that folder is taking up and that is how much space you will need on your backup device to copy it. It will also tell you how many files are in that folder. My "My documents" takes up about 300 megabytes. My "My photos" takes up well over 6 gigabytes. So I will count on needing about 7 gigabytes of memory for *each* backup. If you get an external hard drive, pay the extra bucks and get a one-terabyte drive and you will have lots of space. Or you can get a 32 or a 64 gigabyte thumb drive which, for me, can easily hold my last two backups.
- 7. How many backups should you keep? I only keep the most recent two backups. After I create a

new backup, I delete the oldest from the device to save space.

- 8. Is there anything special about photos? Yes, they take up much more space. On my computer, my pictures take up almost twenty times the space of my documents or other files. So, I handle my pictures differently. I only keep the last two years of pictures on my computer. Every year I copy the oldest photos (from three years ago) to CDs and put them in my photo album. If you have really special photos, you should back them up with your other files and not put them on a CD. I have heard stories that CDs may not last forever and can deteriorate.
- 9. Are there other choices or ways of doing backups? You bet. There are programs that you can buy or download from the Internet that can automatically do the backups for you. Sometimes backup programs come with the memory device you purchase. There is "the cloud" option too, where you can put your files on the cloud and let that company keep them for you (*i.e.*, such as using Google Drive or Dropbox). But their free space is limited and you may have to pay for more space. Perhaps one of these other ways will be more to your liking, but by all means do your backups. One of the worst-case scenarios is that your computer quits working, you decide to buy a new computer, but you cannot move any of your files to the new computer because you didn't make any backups! Every once in a while, ask yourself: "What would I do if my computer quits working?"

[EDITOR'S NOTE: This is indeed a *basic* article for *novices*, and contains much useful advice for them. More experienced computer users, however, should be aware of the following:

- Yes, complete system backups are desirable, though they should be done quarterly rather than monthly. What happens if a hard drive fails, and you opt merely to replace it—a much cheaper alternative to buying an entirely new computer, which is what Mr. Cerny recommends? Unlike a new computer, your new hard drive will not come with an operating system, and you'll have to spend money buying one (unless you use Linux). Programs such as Acronis permit system backups, which are impossible with the normal Windows "Copy" command. Acronis affiliate (he is not an employee) GENE BARLOW's columns appear occasionally in these pages. Watch for them and click on the links for special pricing on Acronis. Also, many computer manufacturers—Lenovo, for example—now include free system backup programs with all their machines, even cheap ones.
- Consider keeping backups *longer* than the two months recommended by Mr. Cerny. Hard drive space is cheap, and thumb drives are also dropping in price. (See STEVE SCHOEMANN—er, ah, A. ARUNDEL's—column on page 6.) As many members of DMA know, I am a desktop publishing enthusiast. And many of you have heard me tell the story—I believe this happened in 2010 or '11—of the time I couldn't find an infrequently-used font. I went back through my monthly backups and couldn't locate it. It turned up at last in a backup *three months old*. The font had mysteriously disappeared at some point in the intervening 90 days. Mr. Cerny wouldn't bother to back up fonts, because they're not documents or photographs, and in any case would not have kept a three-month old backup.]



# In Memoriam: Leonard Spialter ...


Leonard SPIALTER, age 92, formerly of Dayton, passed away Saturday, July 18, 2015 in Columbus. Leonard was born in Newark, New Jersey, in 1923. He held a Ph.D. in chemistry from Rutgers University, where he also earned a BS degree, as well as an MS from Brooklyn Polytechnic. He was a research chemist for the United States Air Force's Division of Aerospace Research at Wright Patterson Air Force Base from 1951 to 1976. After his retirement from the Air Force, he worked for many years as an independent computer consultant. Leonard was a long-time member of Beth Abraham Synagogue and helped organize the Jewish Genealogical Society of Dayton. Dr. Spialter was also a longtime member of DMA.
