## Ten Statistics that reveal the size and scope of the Maker Movement

- There have been over 400 Maker Faires organized around the world since 2012.
- 2 A record 215,000 people attended the two flagship Maker Faires in the Bay Area and New York in 2014, with 44% of attendees being first timers at the Bay Area event, and 61% in New York.
- The White House held its inaugural Maker Faire in 2014. "Today's D.I.Y. is tomorrow's 'Made in America."

#### —Using Foreign Characters in Passwords—

MAGINE A SITE that requires a password to enter—but that password can be only *one* character long! You would have fewer than a hundred possible passwords: the upper and lower-case versions of each letter in the English alphabet, ten numbers, and various punctuation marks.

But now imagine that you had *hundreds* of other characters available. Of course, any recently-built computer could still break the password, but it be a trifle more difficult to do so.

My credit union's password can contain a maximum of ten characters. That always disturbed me. My insurance company's Web site can use passwords as long as thirty-four characters. One day, in an idle moment, I went to the credit union's site and tried to type a foreign character.

What is a foreign character? It can be an accented "e," such as the French word, *élite*, an accented "n", as in the Spanish *cañon* (our "canyon"), an accented "o," as in the German Österreich (Austria), or any other accented characters. As a test, I tried typing an accented character as an answer to one of the security questions most sites use in addition to a password. A common security question is: "What was your mother's maiden name?" I used my late mother in-law's maiden name, *Suárez*.

It worked! The Web site accepted the accented "a" in the answer to the security question.

Of course, the next step was to include accented characters and other symbols not usually found on the typical American keyboard (such as £, for the British pound) in my main password.

The next question is: How to access these characters? Various word-processing programs use different methods. Unfortunately, you can't use word processors to type passwords on Web sites. You could open Microsoft Word or Open Office Writer, type in the accented character, then cut-and-paste it into the Web site, but this is awkward and cumbersome.

The solution is to use the ALT key, coupled with the numbers on your *numeric keypad*, at the right-hand side of your keyboard. (The numbers across the top won't work.) You get  $\acute{e}$  by typing ALT and 130. The euro symbol ( $\acute{e}$ ) is ALT 128. ALT 172 yields  $\rlap/4$ . The Japanese yen symbol ( $\rlap/4$ ) is ALT 165.  $\rlap/4$  (as in Mount  $\rlap/4$ tna, the volcano in Sicily) is ALT 146.

A few final notes:

- ✓ All this is for PCs running Windows, not Apple or Linux machines.
- ✓ Don't confuse the ALT with the CTRL key.
- ✓ If you don't get what you want with the keystroke sequences given in the main article above, try typing a zero (0) before the numbers. For example, if you can't get the cents symbol ( $^{\varrho}$ ) by typing ALT 155, try typing ALT 0155.
- ✓ Few laptop and no netbook keyboards have separate numeric keypads. Each manufacturer (Asus, Dell, H-P, Lenovo, Toshiba, etc.) has its own method of emulating a numeric keypad. Most use a key labeled "FN." Consult your User's Manual.
- ✓ Web sites almost never advertise that they accept foreign characters in passwords. "Special characters" are not the same as foreign characters. Your best bet is trial-and-error.
- ✓ I would be interested in hearing from readers who tried Unicode characters in passwords. Unicode allows you to use alphabets such as Arabic, Chinese, Cyrillic, Greek, or Hebrew.

#### -Safeguarding Windows 10-


I F YOU'VE TAKEN ADVANTAGE OF THE FREE UPGRADE to Windows 10 from Windows 7, 8, or 8.1, you're vulnerable to losing it as well as your data if you don't make some preparations. Your old system installation disk or the recovery CD and backups you created will allow you to restore *only* your old Windows system. If you have a serious crash after July 29, 2016, when the free upgrade period expires, you would then either have to live with your old version or purchase a retail copy of Windows 10. Fortunately, Windows 10 includes utilities to avoid this, but only if you know about and use them. Unfortunately, they are buried deep enough in menus that a casual Windows user may not find them.

Your first task is to create a Windows Recovery Environment on an 8-Gbyte (or larger) USB memory stick with the following procedure:

- Tap the Windows key, type "recovery," and select "Create a recovery drive."
- Select "create recovery drive."
- Be sure the box "Backup systems files to the recovery drive" is selected (Screen 1). Click "continue." This is a slow process; don't get impatient.

This plus a system image (see below) substitute for an installation disk, and they will let you repair Windows and restore your software and data from your backups. Label the memory stick clearly, but before you store it in a safe place, be sure your PC can boot from it. You can also create a recovery environment on a separate hard disk partition, but this less safe as a hard disk failure will destroy it.

You may prefer to create a system repair CD (or make one in addition to a Recovery Environment), a legacy feature from Windows 7 that has fewer features but still allows you to recover your system after serious trouble. Follow these steps to create the disk.



- Tap the Windows key and type "control."
- Select "Backup and Restore (Windows 7)."


Select "Create a system repair disc" (Screen 2 [EDITOR'S NOTE: See the next page]), you may be asked for a password) and follow the instructions.

When you boot using a recovery drive memory stick you are in the Windows Recovery Environment, where you can perform the following tasks:

• perform a system reset,

- use a saved system image to overwrite your entire disk.
- repair the startup files,
- enable safe mode, and troubleshoot your PC (although this requires some expertise).

Although a Recovery Environment memory stick is essential, by itself it won't let you restore Windows 10. For that, you also need a system image, which is a copy of all the software and data on your hard disk. Portable USB-3, 2-Tbyte drives are now available for less than \$100, and these



are adequate for most of us. You might prefer an internal drive, especially if you need more capacity, but an external unit does provide the extra protection of being completely separate from your PC.


To create a system image follow this procedure.

- Tap the Windows key, type "control," select "Control Panel," and under "System and Security," select "Save backup copies of your files with File History".
- Select "System Image Backup" (at the bottom left; see Screen 3; you may have to enter your password).
- Select "Create a system image."

Select "On a hard disk." There are options to use a network drive or DVDs, but the limited capacities

of the latter make the procedure tedious indeed (Screen 4 [EDITOR'S NOTE: next page]).

Because creating a system image is time-consuming, and restoring one replaces the entire contents of your hard disk with the image, you will probably do this infrequently. The Windows 10 backup is called "file history", and by default it runs every hour while your backup drive is connected. It's important to remember that file history saves only your *data*; you must use a system image to restore *software*. As a result, you will want to store a system im-



age every month or so (depending on how often you install or update your software), although you probably want to save file history much more frequently.

Because creating a system image is time-consuming, and restoring one replaces the entire contents of your hard disk with the image, you will probably do this infrequently. The Windows 10 backup is called "file history", and by default it runs every hour while your backup drive is connected. It's important to remember that file history saves only your *data*; you must use a system image to restore *software*. Use this procedure.


- Tap the Windows key, type "settings," select "Settings," then select "Update & security." (Screen 5).
- Select "Backup" (Screen 6 [EDITOR'S NOTE: Next page]).


If your backup disk is not always connected, select "More options", then select "Back up now" (Screen 7 [EDITOR'S NOTE: Once again, please see the next page]).

The first time through this you have to specify where the histories will be stored. After that, you can just connect the backup drive and Windows will automatically perform the action. You will have to select "Back up now" only if the drive is connected for just a short time. Note on Screen 6 the item "Go to Backup and Restore (Windows 7)," which you can use if you prefer it to file history.

Do the following to restore a file from your file history. (If your history is stored on a removable drive, be sure it's connected).

- Tap the Windows key and type "control".
- Select "Control Panel".
- Select "Save backup copies of your files with File History" (under System and Security).







Select "Restore personal files" (see Screen 3 above). You'll see the following (Screen 8 [EDITOR'S NOTE: Bottom of page]).


The files and folders shown are for the date shown. To see earlier version click on the arrow to the left of the green button; to see later ones click on the right arrow. Selecting an item and clicking on the green button will restore it.


However, there is a quicker way to access file history. When you are using the file browser, expand the ribbon (if it's been minimized) by clicking the small down-arrow just to the left of the help button (a blue circle with a question mark). Screen 9 shows a file browser window with an expanded ribbon. [EDITOR'S NOTE: Screen 9 is on the next page.] Then click on "History" to see the file history screen for an item you've selected.

As you can see, using file history can be much more convenient than the older backup and restore technique, especially if you keep your history disk connected to your PC. The particular scheme with which you back up your files isn't important, as long as it's effective, but be sure you have one and test it to be sure it works.










