Create Your Own Favorite RASPBERRY PI

...Presented by Mark CAMDEN

Raspberry Pi is a series of credit-card sized computers able to run Linux. The Raspberry Pi project was born out of frustration expressed by co-inventor Eben Upton while working at Cambridge University. The number of undergraduates in Computer Science was declining each year and their computer skills were lacking. The idea was to inspire the next generation of programmers by providing a computer cheap enough for students to afford and easy enough for them to hack.

Mark will provide an introduction and demonstration of what this \$35 computer can do for you.

The discussion will include the Raspbian "Jessie" OS, Ubuntu Mate operating system, Media Server, Video Surveilance, and Web Server. Mark will also demonstrate support applications such as PuTTY, FileZilla (client), SDFormatter, Win32DiskImager, and Windows Remote Connection.

Mark joined DMA late in 2015 and is also a member of NASAC. He is writing documentation for an "Introduction to Raspberry Pi & Scratch Programming" class for one of the Dayton Diode members. Mark has worked as a Manufacturing/Machinist, Product/Tool Designer, Research & Development Technician, CAD/CAM Tech, Application Engineer, Project Manager, and has experience with Personal Computers, and RC airplanes, quadcopters, and sailboats.

Summer Picnic—Martin Arbagi



Back to Basics ...

—Your Internet Connection—

TODAY MOST PEOPLE have and use more than one computer device that can connect to the Internet. Smart phones (such as the iPhone), tablets, laptops, and desktops all *love* the Internet. In fact, most of these devices try to connect to the Internet automatically. In this article we will look at how you can easily determine the answer to that all important question: *Am I connected to the Internet?*

In the old days, people connected their computers to a network (which could have been a private network) with a wired connection (telephone or private lines), perhaps using a telephone modem. Do you remember those telephone modems with the two rubber cups to hold the handset? Ah, those were the days when carrier pigeons were faster! But enough of days gone by.

Today, access to the Internet is mostly wireless and devices can be connected to it in different ways. One easy way to see if you have Internet access regardless of the device you are using is to try to go to a Web page. If you can, the Web page will display and you know you have access. If not, you should see a message on your screen that tells you there was a problem.

If you are using a smart phone or a tablet device, you may have a model that can use the cellular phone network to access the Internet. This may work just fine, but be aware that you will be using your "minutes" or "bits," which will be billed to your cellular phone bill. I recommend that you only use the cellular network to access the Internet when no other means are available.

There are two icons that seem to be universal for indicating that you are connected to the Internet: a small bar graph or an "eyebrow" icon. In either case, the more "bars" you have on the bar graph or the more "eyebrows" you have, the stronger the Internet signal. You should know where to find these small icons on the screen of your device. They are usually in a corner. You should know how to get to the "settings" option on your device and there will probably be an option that deals with the Internet and will show you if you are connected.

Many portable devices (laptops, tablets, smart-phones) are constantly searching for a wireless Internet connection. Say you went to a restaurant and wanted to get on the Internet. You would look at your device's icon and see that you had no Internet signal or a "not connected" message. So you would ask employees of the restaurant for instructions on how to get connected. They would reply with the name of their Wi-Fi network and a password (if required). Go to the "settings" option on your device and select the wireless network option. You will probably see a list of all the Wi-Fi networks within range of your device. Although you could try to connect using any of the networks found, you probably want to use the network name given to you by the employee.

Naturally, that network should have the strongest signal and be at the top of your list. Select that network and you will be prompted for the password (if needed). Entering the password should get

your connection. The nice thing about this is that the next time you return to that restaurant your device may connect automatically without your having to do anything. That is unless, of course, the location has changed its password.

If you have a problem understanding this for your device, go to Google (on the Internet, of course) and ask Google "How do I connect my iPhone to a Wi-Fi network," or "How do I know I am connected to the Internet on my Toshiba laptop?" etc. Try to be as specific with your device name as possible. It's nice to know if you are connected and what to do if you are not.
